Five values of generosity from New Testament teachings:

Voluntary

2 Cor. 9v7 "You must each make up your own mind as to how you should give..."

Cheerful

2 Cor. 9v7 "Don't give reluctantly or in response to pressure. For God loves the person who gives cheerfully."

Proportional

2 Cor. 8v11-12 "Give what you can according to what you have. If you are really eager to give, it isn't important how much you are able to give. God wants you to give what you have, not what you don't have."

Regular

1 Cor. 16v2 "On every Lord's Day, each of you should put aside some amount of money in relation to what you have earned and save it for this offering. Don't wait until I get there and then try to collect it all at once."

Sacrificial and Generous

2 Cor. 8v2-3 "Though they have been going through much generous trouble and hard times, their wonderful joy and deep poverty have overflowed in rich generosity."

God's plan for giving is not to raise money for the church. Giving is part of God's plan to make disciples. Giving as a means of growing in discipleship:

Giving has great implications for my discipleship to Jesus.

Giving has great implications for others' discipleship to Jesus.

Stages of Growth in Giving

Stage 1	Emerging Givers
Stage 2	Growing Givers
Stage 3	Faithful Givers
Stage 4	Generous Givers

Stage 1 Emerging Givers

- Usually early in the process of following Jesus or even before profession of faith
- Give out of Ego-centric reasons
- I feel good when I give
- I think I'm supposed to give
- I probably should give something

Stage 2 Growing Givers

- Socio-centric in nature, even for philanthropic reasons
- A desire for everyone "to play their part"
- I'm blessed, so I owe it to give
- I believe that God tells us we should be generous, so I will when I can
- I'll do more later

Stage 3 Faithful Givers

- Usually involves some type of commitment to give and is socio-centric for those who don't yet follow Jesus
- I'm in, I believe in this cause
- I want to make a difference and see it through
- Gives through a Theo-centric perspective.
- I give because God has given everything for me
- I give out of worship to God
- I give because I want to participate in the Kingdom of God and his work in the world
- I give because I care and want to love others

Stage 4 Generous Givers

- Gives from a place of maturing, Theo-centric perspective
- God blesses me to be a blessing
- I love to give!
- God created me to give and be generous because all I have is God's to begin with.
- God gives me opportunities to give
- God provides all I need and seems to give me more to give away
- How could I not give considering what God has given to me?

A few best practices when it comes to generosity:

- Giving of "firstfruits" (Tithe)
- "Bless Others" fund
- Simple living
- Grace-giving (sacrificial and spontaneous giving)
